## Male Violence Against Women In Peace Time

The statistics of violent crime in England and Wales are profoundly gendered. Roughly nineteen out of twenty individuals found guilty of violent crime are males, and, in the case of violent crime of a sexual nature, 99 out of 100 perpetrators are males. Almost half of all women (45%) have experienced domestic violence, sexual assault or stalking. Around one in every five girls are sexually abused as children. At least 80,000 women suffer rape every year. And on average, two women a week in England and Wales are killed by a violent partner or ex-partner. The abusers, rapists and murderers behind these statistics are almost invariably male (see annual crime statistics published by the Home Office ONS).

## Militarized Violence Victimizes Women and Damages Men

As we see currently in many African and Middle Eastern countries, the sexualized and domestic violence visited upon women by men in peace time is massively amplified in times of armed conflict. Rape is endemic in war, perpetrated by state armies and rebel militias. Sexual torture is a widespread weapon of police, security services and prison officers in many countries. The victims in some cases include men and boys, but the rapists and torturers are almost always male. Both inflicting and suffering violence is highly damaging to men. Research shows young British servicemen who did active service in Iraq and Afghanistan are three times more likely to be convicted of violent offences back home after their war experience than their civilian peers (*The Guardian*,15.3.2013 p.9).
